Waves of Immigration Event

On **Friday, September 23, 2017 from 6:00-9:00 pm** an event will be held at Wakefield High School to honor the diverse narratives that connect Arlington's past to the present and to our common future. The event, titled *We Are All Arlington: Understanding and Celebrating Our 40 Year Legacy of Immigrants*, will be an evening of visual and performing arts, history and dialogue. An event will also be held during the school day for selected secondary students. Details will be sent out about this event in early September.

Teaching 9/11 Resources

This September will mark the 15th year anniversary of 9/11. Here are some resources to support teachers as they plan to commemorate the day with their students.

The **9/11 Memorial and Museum** site is offering four live **webinars** on Sept 12 at 10 am and 1pm and Sept 13 at 10 am and 1pm. Participants will be introduced to the Museum, learn about 9/11 and hear from Ada Dolch, the former principal of the Leadership and Public Service High School in lower Manhattan. Dolch was responsible for safely evacuating her students on 9/11 at the same time her sister, Wendy Wakeford, was at work on the 105th floor of the North Tower. In 2005, Dolch helped establish a school in Afghanistan in memory of her sister, who was killed. Registration details are available on the <u>memorial website</u>. The webinar will be recorded and available online for classes that miss the live broadcast.

Morningside Center for Teaching Social Responsibility provides teacher guides and resources for teaching the anniversary of 9/11.

PBS Newshour provides background readings, lessons and resources for teaching about this event.

Constitution Day Resources

September 17 is <u>Constitution Day/Citizenship Day</u>, commemorating the September 17, 1787, signing of the U.S. Constitution. To assist students and educators in their studies, the <u>National Archives and Records Administration</u> offers key resources, such as "<u>The Constitution at Work</u>," a match game connecting primary resources to constitutional articles, and "<u>Exploring the U.S. Constitution</u>," an eBook that explores the roots of the three branches of government. Likewise, free online resources are available from the <u>Library of Congress</u>, the <u>National Endowment for the Humanities</u>, and the <u>U.S. Senate</u>. This year is also the 225th anniversary of the passage of the <u>Bill of Rights</u> — the first 10 amendments to the Constitution.
