

## Cultural Responsive Teaching Related to the American Indian

Please note that in the new History and Social Science Standards American Indian is the term being used to describe the native populations that were present in America during exploration and colonization. The new standards also include information to correct the misunderstanding that students often have about the presence of American Indians in our society today, not just during colonial times. As you teach your students about the American Indian population, please be cognizant of presenting accurate instead of stereotypical information.

### Virginia WWI and WWII Commemoration Commission -December 8

Dawn of Infamy will feature an honor parade of World War II veterans, remarks by dignitaries, and a keynote address from Pulitzer-Prize winner and military historian Rick Atkinson. The event also marks the beginning of the *Profiles of Honor Tour*, which will highlight Virginia's role in WWI and WWII. This event is free but <u>registration</u> is required by **November 15**<sup>th</sup>.

#### **World War I Resources**

World War I <u>resources</u> are available that focus on the design and context of war memorials in Virginia. Resources include downloadable files for a World War I lesson plan that focuses on the design and context of war memorials in Virginia. Since there are only a handful of standards that relate to the first war, the lesson plans incorporate themes and objectives from other standards to highlight geographic, historic, cultural, mortuary, and religious themes.
