### **VDOE posts New TEI (Technology-Enhanced Items)**

These practice items are representative of the content and/or rigor of some of the Standards of Learning (SOL) assessment items and illustrate technology-enhanced item types for the history SOL tests. Technology-enhanced items (TEI) require students to indicate their responses in ways other than a multiple-choice format.

The practice items are not intended to be a complete test and are not intended to cover all content for the grade level or course. While the practice items provide examples of some TEI, they are not intended to represent all types of functionality associated with these item types. The social studies SOLs this spring will not include these items for calculating the pass rate. <u>Close Up in Class: Current Issues</u> is a library of interactive resources and classroom units for exploring national and international policy debates. Their nonpartisan resources examine critical public policy questions on a variety of levels:

- **Foundational Units** review the U.S. Federal government, <u>U.S. Foreign Policy</u>, and several longstanding tensions within American Democracy.
- **Current Issues Units** (on topics like <u>Education</u>, <u>Immigration</u>, and the Arab-Israeli Conflict) give students an introduction to the complexities of each topic, and outline arguments on current related controversies (such as School Choice and Negotiations with Iran). - **Monthly Discussions** examine current bills in Congress, Supreme Court cases, and relevant **controversial issues** in the news.
- Teacher Resources include a variety of <u>lesson plans</u>, out-of-class assignments, project

  and practice active citizenship.

### **Document Bank of Virginia – Library of Congress**

<u>Document Bank of Virginia (DBVa)</u> is the Library of Virginia's initiative to get documents into classrooms. Using primary sources, teachers can make history relevant to students while helping them learn and understand state standards. DBVa will teach students to be critical thinkers as they analyze the original documents and draw their own conclusions about Virginia's past.

### Stock Market Game - Virginia Council on Economic Education

Learn to use the Stock Market  $Game^{TM}$  as a valuable educational tool for both teachers and students. Students manage a virtual investment portfolio and compete with teams across the state. Students learn saving and investing, sharpen math and research skills, and experience market forces at work. After participating in the SMG, independent studies show an increase in math scores for elementary and middle school students. It is also a proven way to learn many of the SOL in the high school economics and personal finance course. No prior knowledge of the stock market is necessary. ### The World of 7 Billion student video contest – Population Education

Population Education is currently accepting video entries from middle and high school students for the <u>World of 7 Billion</u> student video contest. The deadline for submissions is **February 25, 2016.** This year's challenge: Create a short video (up to 60 seconds) about human population growth that highlights one of the following global challenges: Deforestation, Public Health OR Water Scarcity. All videos must include a) how population growth impacts the issue, and b) at least one idea for a <u>sustainable solution</u>. Participating teachers are eligible to receive complimentary classroom resources when 10 or more students participate. 18 student winners will receive up to \$1,000 in cash prizes.
