Office Announcements

New Curriculum: In the fall of 2016, a new curriculum will be implemented in grades K-12. The curriculum framework for this new curriculum can be found at http://www.doe.virginia.gov/testing/sol/standards docs/history socialscience/
A crosswalk document between the old and new standards is anticipated in early May.

Power Standards: A team of teachers has identified draft power standards for grades K-12 based on the new curriculum. At the secondary level, grade level teams have had an opportunity to review the drafts for their courses. At the elementary level, social studies lead teachers will be seeking feedback from K-5 teachers this spring so that the draft power standards are ready for fall implementation.

Inspire Virginia

<u>Inspire Virginia</u> is a year-long civic learning program for high school seniors. Teachers may nominate students for the program or interested students can apply directly. As part of the fully funded program, student will participate in the following activities:

- Lead official voter registration efforts in school.
- Be trained to work as poll workers on Election Day.
- Meet with lawmakers and community organizations.
- Participate in leadership development conferences with other student leaders.

Color the Economic Concepts Contest 2015-2026 - Virginia Council on Economic Education

Elementary students have the opportunity to learn and illustrate their knowledge of economic concepts in a creative way. Eight state winders will each received a Virginia 529 inVest account with an initial \$100 balance. Art will be displayed at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond and posted on VCEE's website, where more contest information can be found.

2016 Youth Leadership Summit - Sister Cities International

The 2016 Youth Leadership Summit will help mark Sister Cities International's 60th anniversary through a specialized diplomatic simulation moderated by the U.S. Diplomacy Center, site visits, speaker sessions, and peer collaboration. NMAI Teacher in Residence Program - Call for Applications

The National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) department of education is pleased to announce a new Teacher-in-Residence program. This program serves a vital role in Native Knowledge 360° (NK360°), the museum's national education initiative to inspire and promote the improvement of teaching and learning about American Indians.

The NMAI is currently offering <u>two paid residencies</u>: one teacher will serve for ten months (academic year 2016–17) and another for six to eight weeks (summer 2016). Street Law - Teaching for Civic Engagement Seminar

The seminar is designed for secondary teachers and district or state-level social studies specialists and offers exciting, interactive strategies that will engage students in civics and government lessons. Participants will collaborate with each other and learn from Street Law's staff and guest expert resources. Topics will include:

- current public issues in civics and government (including voting rights and restrictions, political polarization, medical and recreational marijuana, and America's role in the world)
- required government and civics content (including state and local government, foreign policy, federalism, and the judiciary)
- engaging strategies for building students' civic skills (including constructing arguments, evaluating claims, deliberating, negotiating, and taking action)

National Portrait Gallery's Summer Teacher Institute

The Summer Teacher Institute will take a broad look at the Portrait Gallery's collection. During the institute, the museum's curators and historians will provide in-gallery content lectures, introducing the collection. Utilizing an interactive approach, NPG educators will model a variety of "learning to look" strategies—unique ways to hook and engage students when they look closely at portraits. Participants will learn how to "read" portraiture and use the art as a springboard into a more in-depth discussion about biography and history. Teachers in grades kindergarten-12 may apply as individuals or as part of a team. Priority will be given to social studies, English/language arts, and visual arts teachers.
