National Portrait Gallery Workshop - Using Portraiture to Teach a Socratic Seminar

The Portrait Gallery has teamed up with a secondary U.S. history teacher to consider the Socratic seminar in the context of portraiture. The Socratic method involves a shared dialogue between teacher and students—the teacher leads by posing thought-provoking questions, and students engage by asking questions of their own. In this workshop, facilitators will model the method, considering text, both visual and written, from nineteenth-century U.S. history. Participants will then participate in a Socratic seminar, and finally time will be given for participants to create their own seminar . . . all through the lens of portraiture!
