

GerryRIGGED: Turning Democracy On Its Head - public television documentary

The exhibit looks closely at how the lives of the Washington's were intertwined with the lives of the enslaved people on their five farms, looking specifically the lives of nineteen enslaved individuals. This groundbreaking exhibit highlights George Washington's changing views of slavery, culminating in his decision to include a provision in his will freeing the enslaved people he owned.
