Defining Policy and PIPs



Policy

- Policies are principles of action
- The School Board creates policy and governs through the policy it creates

Policy Implementation Procedures (PIPs)

- PIPs are the procedural steps that APS follows to implement School Board's Policies
- The Superintendent manages operations of the school system in accordance with School Board policies

What's the Goal for the Updates?

Revise policy (25-2.2) to prepare for 30,000+ students

- provide blend of neighborhood & option schools
- ensure equitable access
- simplify the policy, standardize practices Community input will shape final revisions



School Board decision in June New policy effective for 2018-19



- 1. Policy Revision Transportation

 For students who live outside of defined walk zone
 - APS provides transportation to Neighborhood Schools, Option schools
 - Parents/guardians responsible for transportation for neighborhood transfers
 - APS may still identify "transportation waivers" as a tool for balancing enrollment



2. Policy Revision – for admissions to option schools

Elementary - keeps siblings together

- Maintains sibling preference for concurrently enrolled students
- Maintains twins admitted as two but treated as one
- Expands definition of twins

Secondary – adjustment

Twins are considered separately (not treated as one)



- 3. Policy Revision clarifies difference between
 - Admission to an option school
 - Transfer to a neighborhood school

The PIPs identify different processes for each



- 4. Both PIPs define a process for APS to annually to publish a list of schools that includes
 - The number of seats available at options schools
 - Schools that can accommodate neighborhood transfers

handled annually; no waitlists



5. Elementary and Secondary PIP include standardize application and selection processes for option schools

Central registration will

- Process applications
- Conduct lotteries
- Notify parents
- Manage waitlist



6. Elementary and Secondary PIP includes adjusted admissions procedures for Elementary Immersion schools to ensure language balance that aligns with the immersions instructional model



- 7. Elementary and Secondary PIP removes guaranteed admission preferences across policy
 - Team (Key/ASFS/Jamestown/Taylor)
 - Feeder schools to Campbell, Barrett, Claremont
 - Cluster, Neighborhood Priority, etc.

Staff is analyzing impact of removing guarantee, information will be posted A.S.A.P.



- Upcoming will gather community input on H-B Woodlawn lottery allotment
 - Current policy today allotment based on the proportion of fifth graders living in each neighborhood school attendance zone
 - Option for an adjusted approach allocate slots to all APS elementary schools based on the actual number of 5th graders attending each school (regardless of their attendance zone); Home-school and private school applicants would continue to apply according to neighborhood zone address

- Simplify and standardize access
- Support short-term and long-term goals
- Align with results from community feedback form
- Provide for efficient transportation
- Consider specialized instructional program options

Elementary

(Total new seats: xxx)

- Neighborhood schools
- One Option School in each zone: Immersion, IB
- Countywide Option Schools: ATS, Campbell and Montessori





Middle

(Total new seats: xxx)

- 6 Neighborhood schools with program options
- Each middle school with a focus on 1 of 3 options:
 Immersion, IB or STEAM; Open access within zone
- Countywide 6-8 Options: HB, Montessori



High

(Total new seats: xxx)


- 3 Neighborhood with identified focus
- Countywide Options 9-12: HB & IB Diploma Program
- Arlington Tech (option and/or neighborhood if campus expanded sufficiently)
- Career Center
- Arlington Community High School
- Langston




K-12 Scope & Sequence: Zone 1 (West)






K-12 Scope and Sequence: Zone 2

Option A: Education Center Site

Washington-Lee's capacity increases with space for

- 9th Grade Academy (smaller learning environment) for Washington-Lee students plus
- Expand International Baccalaureate

Option B: Kenmore Site

- Kenmore MS remains
- Building added for a 1300 seat Neighborhood High School

Option C: Career Center Site

Career Center's capacity increases with space for

- Arlington Tech remains and
- Space added for a 1,300 Neighborhood High school
