Read&Write Chrome Extension

Read & Write is a Google Chrome Web App that increases the accessibility of the text of documents in your Google Drive account. Here's a link

After installing the app you will see a Read & Write tab appear at the top of your browser window whenever you have a document open in Google Drive. Taking Action Against Fake News

A recent <u>study from Stanford University</u> revealed that many teenagers have difficulty determining the credibility of what they read online. In California, two separate bills introduced by lawmakers aim to help teach students to think more critically about the news. The critical thinking skills focus of the new Virginia Standards of Learning should help address this issue. However, teachers are encouraged to incorporate analysis of the credibility of sources into classroom instruction. Resources available to help students learn to recognize fake news include: <u>Newsela, PBS NewsHour, The News Literacy Project, Media Education Lab</u> and <u>the Center for Media Literacy</u>.
