AAPS

Option schools are essential to managing growing enrollment

- APS does not intend to overfill any school, disproportionate to other schools serving same level.
- Projections will be evaluated annually for the following school year so that option school enrollment can be adjusted as needed
- Growth is framed by
 - adding a class at the entry grade
 - remaining within the limits defined by the Facilities
 Optimization Study
- This process has been new in 2017-18 and will be revised per lessons learned

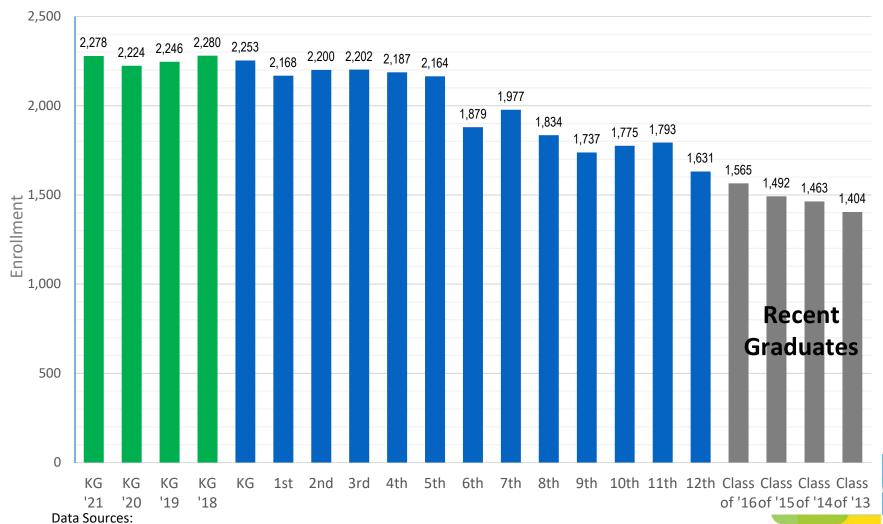

- 3. Recent graduates based on the September 30 official count for School Years 2013 through 2016.

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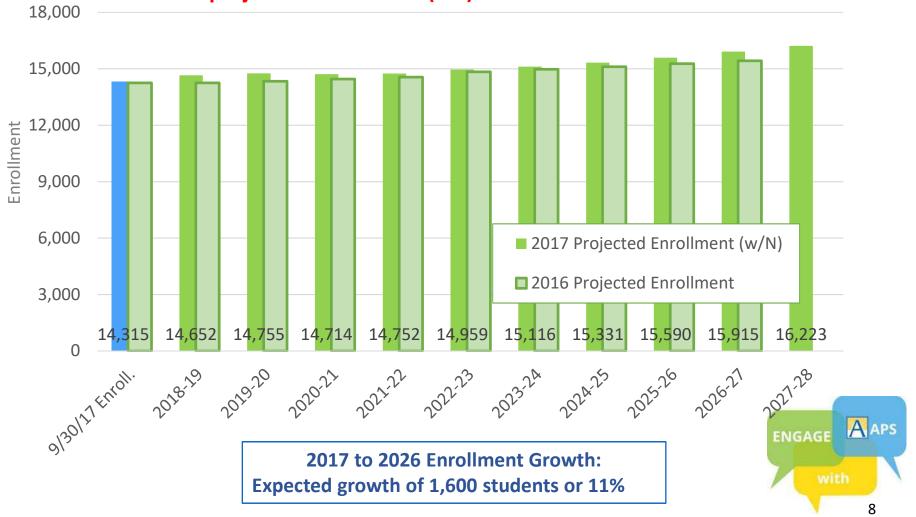
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2017 Projections for PreK-Grade 5

Correction: Sept. 30 2017 PreK- Grade 5 enrollment was lower than projected in Fall 2016 (-50)

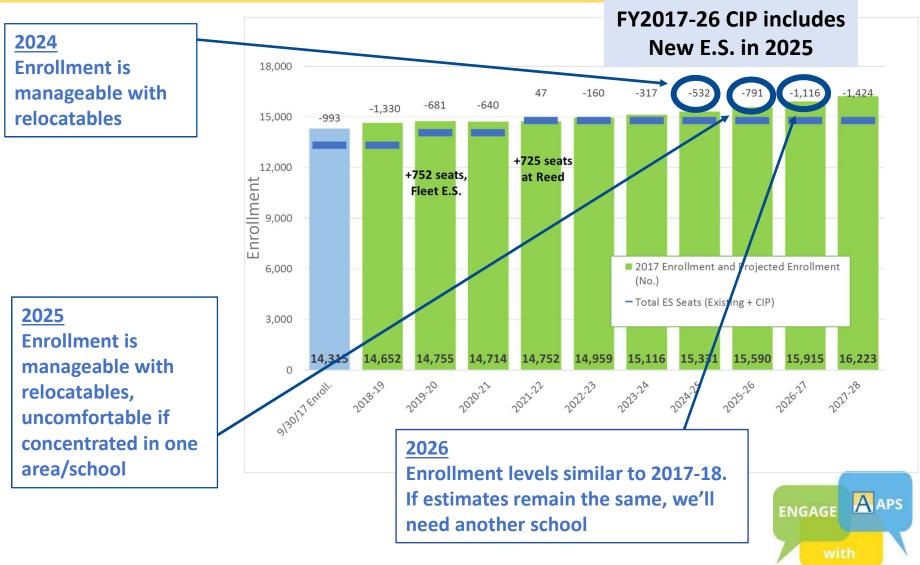

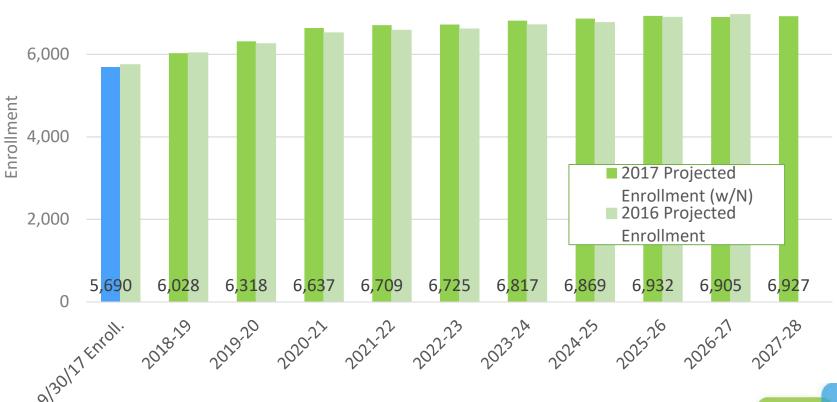

- If estimates remain the same, we'll need additional seats



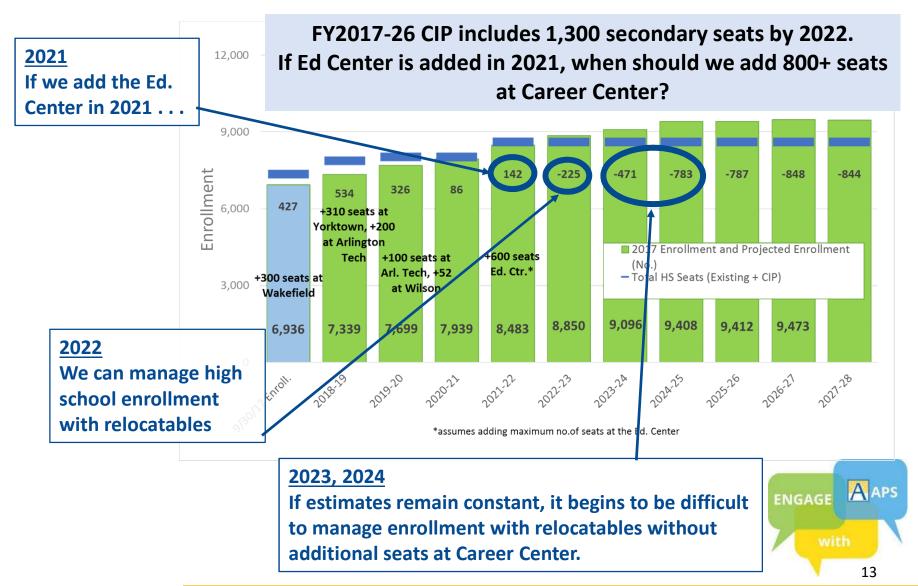

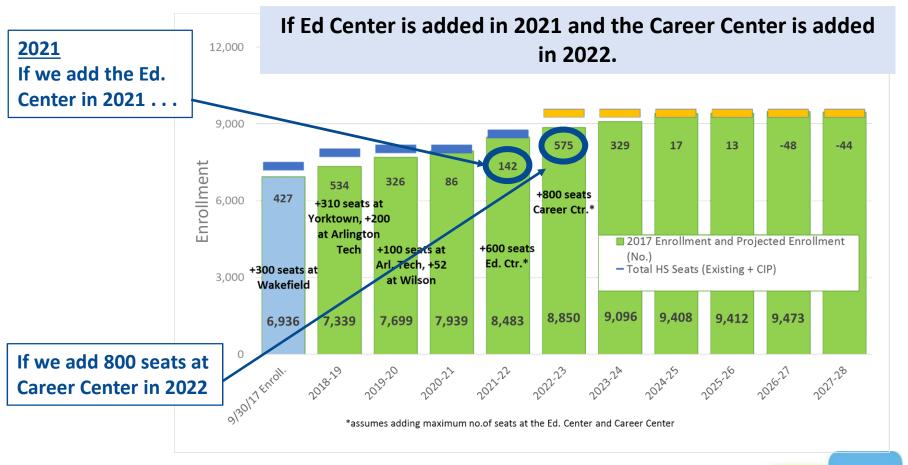






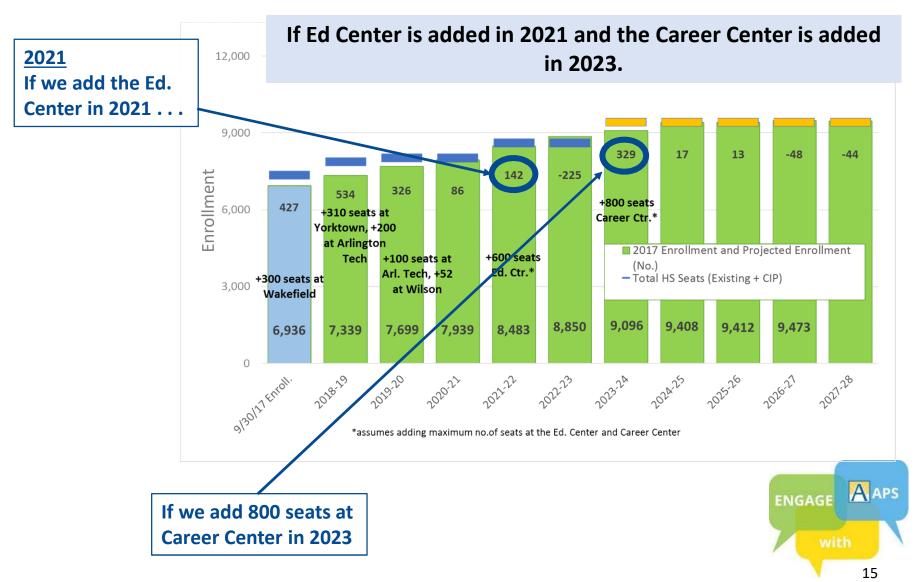




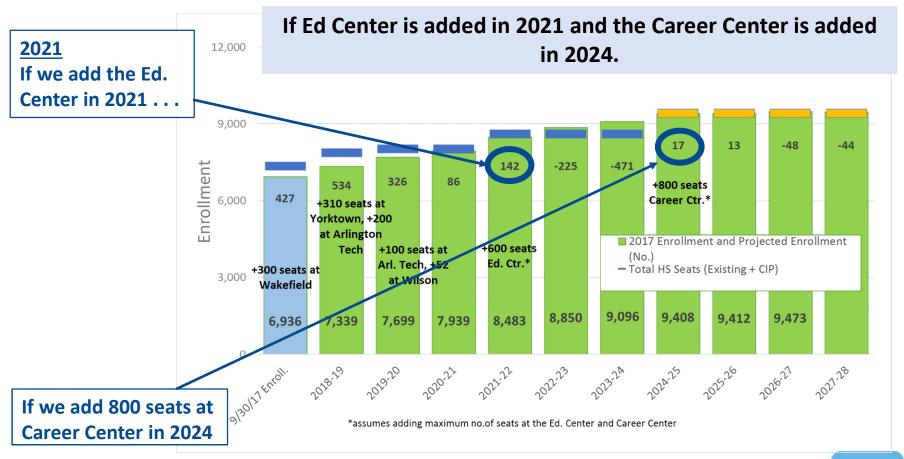






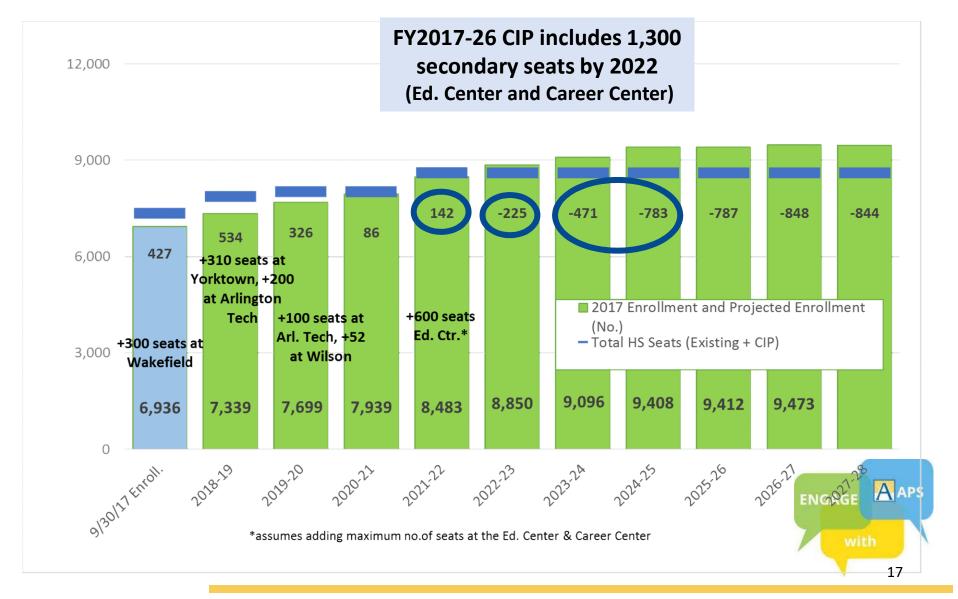












2019-28 CIP Continuing Projects

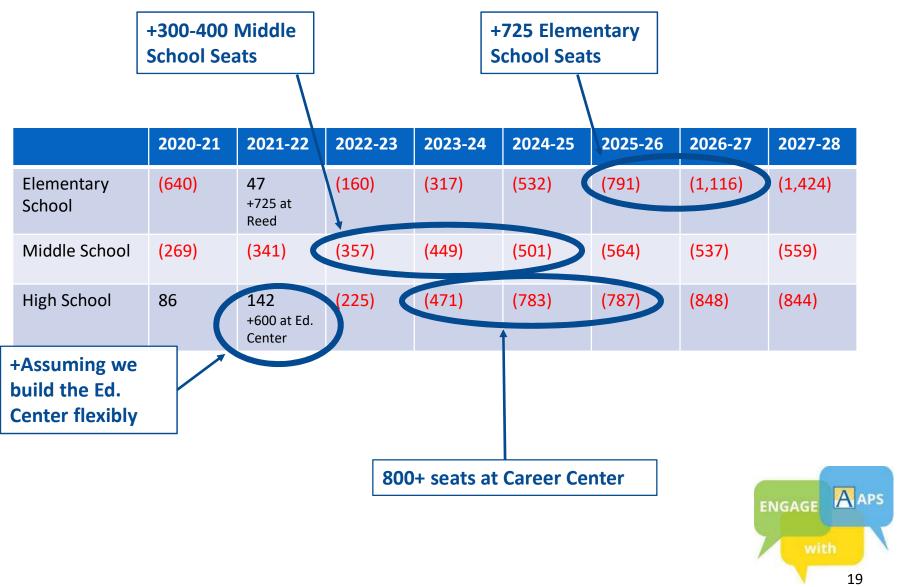
