NewselaPRO Access for Secondary APS Schools

FREE Curriculum: Japanese American Incarceration in World War II - Choices Program

Japanese American Incarceration in World War II draws students into the history of Japanese American incarceration in the United States. To better understand this history, students examine U.S.-Japanese relations before World War II, the varied experiences of incarcerated Japanese Americans, and the ways that members of the Japanese American community and others in the United States have remembered and continue to remember incarceration. <u>Free</u> curriculum and materials available from the Choices Program.

Student & Teacher Opportunities

Request for Proposals (RFP): Teaching the Human Story - National Geographic Society

Educators are invited to extend the impact of National Geographic's <u>Out of Eden Walk</u> by incorporating it into their teaching. A decade-long expedition, Out of Eden Walk is an experiment in slow journalism, in which Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and National Geographic Fellow Paul Salopek retraces—on foot—the first humans' migration out of Africa and across the globe. This RFP is available to K-12 formal and informal educators globally. The goal of the RFP is to support educators who can use Out of Eden Walk as a catalyst for teaching about the topics addressed by Salopek's journey: humans' relationship with the environment, cultural diversity, empathy, global perspectives, and more.

Weinstein Properties Story of Virginia Teacher Education Institute

This five-day course is held at the Virginia Museum of History & Culture with a day-long field trip to the Moton Museum at Longwood University. Examining stories from Virginia's past through primary sources, experts from the Virginia Museum of History & Culture and Longwood University will also provide examples for project-based learning, performance-based assessments, and tips and techniques for engaging students in grades K-12. Choose between two sessions: <u>July 9-13</u> or <u>July 23-27</u>. Session cost: \$50. Earn up to 45 recertification points while exploring the history of Virginia, project-based learning, and teaching with primary sources!

Primarily Virginia Free Online Summer Course

Primarily Virginia is an online course designed for teachers to explore Virginia's past by examining objects and primary sources. This summer's course will use stories from Virginia's past that relate to Triumph & Tragedy, the 2019 National History Day theme. During six week-long modules, K-12 teachers will learn Virginia's history and also craft performance-based materials suitable for their classroom based on materials from the VMHC, all while receiving up to 45 re-certification points. Participating teachers will also receive a membership to the Virginia Historical Society. The course is offered free of charge to Virginia teachers, thanks to the generous support of the MeadWestvaco Corporation and the MeadWestvaco Foundation. Primarily Virginia is limited to 30 students and will launch on July 9, 2018. Please register by July 6, 2018.
