- 1. Approve Minutes
- 2. Bond Adoption
  - a. Update provided by Laura Saul Edwards.
- 3. Liaisons
  - a. Miles Mason will be ACI liaison
    - i. ACI update: challenge in providing GT and language, esp. in middle school
  - b. Looking for volunteers to cover others.
  - c. JFAC Update (Colleen Pickford)
    - i. JFAC very interested in "what does APS need from us"
    - ii. APS has/will provide list of facilities' needs, combination of short and long term needs
    - iii. Next meeting: Nov 28
  - d. BAC Update (Stacy Snyder)
    - i. Looking for partnerships to support budget needs (e.g., community colleges, mental health services)
  - e. CCPTA update (Laura Saul Edwards):
    - i. Intensive look at usage of PTA money
- 4. Capital Project Update: full summary provided; below are highlights
  - a. Career Center: working on plans for traffic study
  - b. Fleet ES: construction moving along
  - c. Ed Center: Ed spec should be approved in Jan 2019
  - d. Reed ES: Use permit approved; construction cost estimate is coming in below the \$55M budget.
  - e. Stratford: some delays due to wet weather/storms; working on recovery schedule
  - f. Wilson School: Have had issues getting electric and gas; should have power in the building by January; as of today, all permits for gas have been received and construction will begin next week
- 5. MC/MM Update
  - a. MC/MM funded ~\$5M-\$6M per year, and is distributed fairly evenly to all schools (looking at past 3 to 4 years)
  - b. Statistics on age, recent renovations can be found on APS website (under Statistics)
  - c. > 100 projects completed and >\$4M spent in 2018
  - d. Project completion rates have increased steadily, to 87% completion in FY2018

- e. School Project types for MC/MM include relocatable installations, internal room conversions, flooring, medium-sized HVAC/electrical/plumbing, theater/gym/kitchen/art & music room equipment upgrades, playground/parking lot/field upgrades
- f. Division-wide Projects include gym/bleacher safety inspections, safety/security improvements, environmental testing for lead in water, etc.
- g. Complete renovations/refreshes of schools are harder to do now because of lack of swing space, funding, etc. The MC/MM process does build in routine systems upgrades.
- h. 2018 highlights: returned all leased relocatables and using newer purchased units; Room conversions; HVAC controls updates; new playgrounds, new PA and fire systems; flooring and painting; new storage sheds
- i. Playgrounds are reviewed by safety officer annually; upgrades based more on equipment or safety
- 6. Ed Center Reuse (BLPC/PFRC)
  - a. Had two of four meetings
  - b. Next meeting will cover transportation issues and building interior
  - c. Looking at constructing covered connection between W-L and Ed Center (security is a potential issue)
- 7. Audit Report John Mickevice
  - a. Comparable, line-by-line division costs for 30 schools in VA, MD and DC
  - Includes costs beyond APS ed specs, including: A/E fees due to additional meetings, escalation due to permitting issues, community amenities, off-site parking fees, structured parking, others
  - c. Conclusions:
    - i. construction costs are comparable to other jurisdictions;
    - ii. particular challenges such as site constraints, other factors; community engagement a significant factor;
    - iii. A/E and PM fees tend to be higher due to previous factors
    - iv. High schools less than two-thirds comparable HS; ES comparable
    - v. Construction market study concluded a 5% escalation should be used
    - vi. Competitive costs, labor competition, and materials competition all factor in higher costs
  - d. APS is applying lessons learned from this and recent construction to improve performance (e.g., Reed example)
  - e. Arlington and DMV generally more transparent in presenting costs (so harder to compare across the country)
- 8. Elementary School Boundary Discussion
  - a. FAC should develop a statement to present to the SB at the public hearing next week
  - b. Some ideas:
    - i. Positives:
      - Robust process with well-defined considerations
      - Desirable to go to county-wide, routine boundary adjustments (every 3 to 5 years)

- ii. This is part of a County-wide process, so what lessons from this boundary process can be brought to the next?
- iii. How does the County consider the impact on education when large populations are moved from one school to another during the boundary process?
- iv. APS learned a lot from the public process
- v. Boundary process needs to be more consistently done, frequently, county-wide
  Some dissent on this (based on frequency, primarily)
- vi. Will boundary/capacity be impacted if we had more option/immersion schools
- vii. Western end of the Pike populations may have been impacted in this process
- viii. Want watch language in letter that implies "harm" or other subjective terms that cannot be backed by data
- ix. Emphasize positives from the process and how the process helped/hurt utilization of buildings
- c. How can we understand how different schools have different capacities (e.g., some schools can operation at 120% capacity while others 105%)
- 9. Amazon HQ2 Discussion
  - a. FAC will put together a letter to send to the SB and the CB on the importance of integrated long-range planning
  - b. The arrival of Amazon should give us greater confidence that we will reach the higher levels of projected enrollment
- 10. Subcommittee meeting for Common Space
  - a. The date of the upcoming meeting was announced, FAC members encouraged to attend.
