Arlington Public Instructional Programs and Pathways (IPP)

What is the Instructional Programs and Pathways (IPP)?

The IPP is a framework that does the following:

- Defines the role of neighborhood schools, option schools and all instructional programs.
- Provides a comprehensive list and descriptions of current instructional programs and options (PreK to Adult) in a centralized location.
- Provides a clear instructional vision for the future that aligns with the APS mission, vision, Strategic Plan, and new equity policy. This could include recommendations to:
 - Expand current programs
 - Changes or modifications to existing programs
 - Create new programs
 - Move programs to new sites
 - Consolidate programs
 - Eliminate programs
- Identifies criteria for assessing instructional programs in the IPP:
 - Existing programs will be assessed as part of APS program evaluation process
 - New programs will be screened when proposed as part of the visioning process



Arlington Instructional Programs and Pathways (IPP)

Why is the IPP Important?

- The IPP will serve as a framework for making decisions around instructional visioning that will inform APS planning initiatives, including the annual budget, Capital Improvement Plan, boundary processes, and the Arlington Facilities and Student Accommodation Plan (AFSAP).
- One goal of the APS 2018-24 Strategic Plan is to provide multiple pathways to student success. The IPP will define current options for our students as well as APS's vision for the future to help achieve this goal.
- The IPP will align with the new APS equity policy and reflect APS's commitment to ensuring equity and access while providing educational excellence for all students, whether they attend a neighborhood school or access a specific instructional program or options



Arlington Instructional Programs and Pathways (IPP)

Goals

- 1. Ensuring equity and access in all programs
- 2. Ensuring multiple pathways to student success
- 3. Promoting demographic diversity in our programs and schools
- 4. Assisting with managing enrollment at all school levels

IPP Visioning Process

The IPP process began in 2018-19. This dynamic and fluid visioning process continues to be developed in 2020-21. The instructional visioning is ongoing, with updates provided annually as part of the cycle of development, implementation, evaluation, refinements, and changes.

New features of the IPP now include:

- Name change from the "Instructional Program Pathways" to the "Instructional Programs and Pathways"
- Expansion to include all PreK-Adult programs: general education, English Learner programs, Special Education, Dual Enrollment, exemplary projects, adult education
- Description of the relationship between the IPP, Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and Arlington Facilities and Student Accommodation Plan (AFSAP)
- Articulation of IPP program criteria and an evaluation component for instructional programs
- Program audit to help inform APS's work in identifying areas of need and ensuring equity and access.
 - Identify enrollment trends and demographic composition of programs
 - Identify areas of under and over representation of certain student groups


Stakeholder Engagement
