For these reasons, APS and the Arlington School Board may adjust future budget allocations, staffing and other operations decisions to reflect the existing community and operating landscape.

- Build a new facility to serve full-time Arlington Career Center students, students from across APS high schools, and prepare for future enrollment as Arlington plans for growth.



# Recognizes Enrollment is Changing



### **Enrollment may be leveling off**

- Too early to use projections beyond first few years for making long-term decisions
- 2021-22 monthly enrollment is increasing, and Sept. 2022 enrollment may exceed projections

#### Schools are a priority as the County considers development

Arlington Community High School getting a new home, a major public benefit

• Amazon's HQ2 at PenPlace will include a new facility for ACHS, opening summer 2026

Land use plans and studies identify space for future schools and/or expansions, if enrollment levels rise and APS needs additional capacity

- Pentagon City Planning Study identifies a County-owned property like Virginia Highlands Park/Aurora Hills Library/Community Center\* site
- Plan Langston Boulevard will use a similar approach

# **Funds Major Infrastructure Projects**

Ongoing capital program for major building systems replacements that have reached the end of serviceable life. Examples include HVAC, electrical and lighting, and building envelope (roofing and windows).

#### **Ongoing Projects**

- Randolph roof replacement
- Barcroft HVAC replacement (partially grant funded)

### **Upcoming Projects**

- Escuela Key roof replacement
- Hoffman-Boston HVAC replacement
- LED lighting upgrades at various sites

# Continues to Fund Projects in the FY 2022-24 CIP

## Renovations: Kitchens and Entrances/Security Vestibules

Complete upgrades so all schools meet current standards.

- Standardizing kitchens with appropriate on-site food storage and preparation space, providing a minimum of two lunch lines to serve more students in less time
- Creating security entrances to ensure visitors check in at the main office

# The Heights Building Phase Two is Critical to Provide Universal Access to the Campus


Completes the site which opened in Aug 2019; Phase Two was delayed to accommodate the temporary fire station. The project provides/completes a **universally accessible campus** with the following:

- A path to a main entrance adjacent to the Shriver Program;
- Convenient accessible parking for staff and visitors, immediately adjacent to a building entrance;
- Off-street parent pick-up/drop-off; and
- A new synthetic turf field.

# Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP Long-Range Plan to Renovate Existing School Facilities

### Immediate Goals of the Long-Range Renovation Plan:

#### FY 2023-32 Adopted CIP

- Propose a framework and guidelines for evaluating schools
- Identify potential funding source and availability

#### First Renovation Targeted to Begin Fall 2026

 With specific projects defined and prioritized in future planning, funding will be specified in next CIP

# Arlington Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP **New - Modernize APS Enterprise Resource Planning System**

### **APS** needs to modernize the Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) System used by Finance and Human Resources to perform their core job functions

- The ERP system is known within APS as STARS
- STARS was implemented in 2005
- Oracle is phasing out support for the APS's current ERP platform
- Recommendation is to move to Oracle Fusion Cloud
- Modernization, which will take place over the next three years, will:
  - Help APS remain in regulatory compliance,
  - Improve how we serve stakeholders, and
  - Proactively improve operational efficiencies

# **Lock and Key Systems Replacement**

- APS currently has 16 different key systems throughout the division
- Need to transition all lock and key systems, especially those in classrooms, to push-button operation for safety and security.

# **Public Address (PA) Systems Replacement**

- Many PA systems in schools are approaching 25 years old
- Many systems are failing, and replacement parts are unavailable
- This CIP would address the six schools most in need

- Kenmore field is currently grass
- County is including the field conversion in its FY 2023-32 CIP
- APS and the County currently have a cost sharing agreement for fields
- This CIP includes APS's share of the conversion cost





# **Plans to Temporarily Relocate ACHS**



Amazon's HQ2 development at PenPlace includes a new permanent facility, available by summer 2026

#### **Summer 2023 Relocation**

- ACHS will move to a temporary location with appropriate transit connections available for students
- Move will allow construction of the ACC Project to begin


# **Builds a New Facility for the Arlington Career Center**

- Completes the modernization of high schools
- Provides state of the art learning spaces for diverse student body
- Adds curricular offerings for full-time ACC students
- Doubles career and technical (CTE) classes for students enrolled at other high schools
- Allows for the growth of Arlington Tech
- Proactively prepares for enrollment considering increased housing density in Arlington County land use plans and studies



# Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP Context of Funding in 10-Year CIP

- Funding is provided for a variety of projects at many schools across the ten years
- Proposed 2023-32 CIP allocates approximately
  - 55% for improvements to existing facilities, not including any future funding for the long-range renovation plan
  - 45% for the ACC project (new building, field, parking garage)





# Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP Influence of Market Conditions on Project Funding

### **Accounting for Uncertainty**

- All proposed project funding includes monies set aside for:
  - Escalation/Inflation anticipated increases in construction costs
  - Contingency unplanned/unforeseen conditions
- Given current market conditions of atypical rising construction costs, the proposed project funding was adjusted to increase both the per annum escalation rate and contingency amounts.
- The adjustments provide additional flexibility in mitigating future uncertainty.



# **History of Bond Referenda**

# **Context for the Proposed 2022 Bond Referendum**

- 2020 and 2021 bond referenda were limited due to the pandemic
- Most capital plans put on hold
- Prior to the pandemic, 2014-2018 bond referenda averaged \$116M
- 2020-2022 bond referenda averaged \$80M
- 2022 bond catches up capital planning

# **Funds Major Infrastructure Projects**

### **Major Infrastructure Projects**

Note: projects beyond those listed in the Major Infrastructure Projects overview slide (#7) will be influenced by the Long-Range Plan to Renovate Existing School Facilities

#### **Details**

- Funds various system replacement projects that include, but are not limited to, HVAC, electrical and lighting, and building envelope (roofing and windows)
- Often requires scheduling when building is empty and is executed by non-APS contractors
- Work may be staged and funded over several years
- Recently completed projects include Randolph and Gunston HVAC replacements

- Annual bond funding proposed, increases each year to account for inflation
- Includes FY 2022-24 funds for Air Quality and HVAC Upgrades since Major Infrastructure includes HVAC replacement



# **Continuing Projects from FY 2022-24 CIP**

### Renovations: Kitchens and Entrances/Security Vestibules

#### **Details**

- The FY 2022-24 CIP listed funding for several groups of projects. To permit greater flexibility administering the improvements, this CIP establishes a single line item for the Kitchen and Entrance/Security Vestibule Renovation Program with dedicated funding
- Claremont entrance added; was unintentionally omitted from the FY 2022-24 CIP
- Completion timeline was based on priorities established by Safety, Security, Risk and Emergency Management, and Food and Nutrition Services staff

- Total funding for the program increased compared to what was included in previously adopted CIPs
- The increase in estimated project costs is attributed to current market condition escalation, delays due to supply chain concerns, and the addition of a new facility (Claremont)

# The Heights Building Phase 2

#### **Details**

 County Board action on the Use Permit is expected later this year and will inform completion date and cost

### **Funding**

 No new funding is identified; future bond funds are as adopted in the FY 2022-24 CIP



# **Continuing Projects from FY 2022-24 CIP**

# **Replace Synthetic Turf Fields**

#### **Details**

County and school CIPs each include a share of cost to replace synthetic turf fields in:

- FY 2023 Wakefield HS, \$491,000
- FY 2024 Washington-Liberty HS and Williamsburg MS, \$1,087,000
- FY 2025 Greenbrier Stadium (Yorktown HS), \$828,000

- Replacement fields cannot be paid for by bonds, must be paid for with current revenue
- If included in annual MC/MM budget, then MC/MM needs to be increased to account for the additional cost of the field replacements



# Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP Continuing Projects from FY 2022-24 CIP

### **Planning Funds**

Proposal realigns planning funds in last CIP for projects in the Superintendent's proposed CIP

#### **Details**

- The FY 2022-24 CIP identified previous bond funding "to provide options to meet 10-year projected seats need"
- Given the current state of enrollment, the Superintendent recommends broadening use of these funds to plan for any capital project, including renovations of existing facilities, not just those that provide additional seats

- \$2.0 million in previous bond funding identified in the FY 2022-24 CIP
- No new funding is required



## New - Modernize Enterprise Resource Planning System

#### **Details**

- Current ERP platform originally implemented in 2005
- Oracle is phasing out support for the current ERP platform
- Project will take approximately 32 months
  - Phase 0 Discovery and RFP Phase (5 months) currently underway
  - Phase 1 Core Function Migration (est. 13 months)
  - Phase 2 Additional Enhancements (est. 14 months)
- Modernizing the ERP system will cost an estimated \$4M per year for the next 3 years (FY23-25)

#### **Funding**

• Sources: \$3.66M in grant funding currently on hand; \$3.72M earmarked from non-bond funded Capital Reserves; remainder to come from Reserves and/or FY23 and FY24 Closeouts

# Arlington Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP New – Safety and Security Systems Replacements

#### **Lock and Key Systems Replacement**

#### **Details**

• The project is projected to take one year to complete (FY 2023)

#### **Funding**

Total cost is \$4.4 million

#### **Public Address (PA) Systems Replacement**

#### **Details**

• The project is projected to take three years to complete the six schools most in need

#### **Funding**

Funding of \$1.35M in this CIP

# Superintendent's Proposed FY 2023-32 CIP New – Kenmore Field Conversion to Synthetic Turf

#### **Details**

 County and Schools CIPs both include a share of the cost to convert Kenmore's field to synthetic turf in FY 2030

- Field conversions can be paid for with bonds
- APS' share of the conversion cost is \$3.02 million



# **Relocate Arlington Community High School (ACHS)**

#### **Details**

- Relocation must be done by summer 2023 to begin construction of ACC
- The FY 2022-24 CIP project, as initially contemplated, is no longer needed
- Funding to support the temporary ACHS location can be estimated once a site is identified.

- Reallocate the \$6.18 million in previous bond funding identified in the FY 2022-24 CIP to the Career Center project
- Relocation must be funded by a source other than bonds, of a value TBD required to support the temporary ACHS location



# **Arlington Career Center (ACC) Project**

### Builds new school for ACC, parking garage and field

Capacity for 1,795 students, using concept design approved by School Board on April 28, 2022

#### **Details**

- Opens new school facility by Dec. 2025, parking garage and field by April 2027
- Provides facility on par with other APS high school facilities
- Expands curricular offerings not currently available to full-time ACC students
- Doubles career and technical classes for students enrolled at other high schools - 300 seats offered, three times per day = 900 total
- Allows for growth of the Arlington Tech program
- Concept design shaped by BLPC and PFRC



# School Board Recommended Direction for the FY 2023-32 CIP


