What is REACH?

REACH stands for Regional, Education, Assessment, Crisis Services, Habilitation.

REACH emphasizes the prevention of crises before they occur. This is done through early identification of individuals, development of crisis response plans, training, and technical assistance.

The underlying philosophy of REACH is that people's lives go better when everyone involved in supporting the individual works as a team to develop ideas and strategies that will work best for the person.

Who is eligible for REACH services?

Individuals of any age with documented evidence of:

- Intellectual and/or developmental disability and
- Mental health and/or at risk behavioral challenges

Who can make a referral to REACH?

Referrals may be made by individuals and families, Case managers/Support Coordinators, or other natural supports in a person's life.

Who meets criteria for REACH services?

Examples of individuals who might be referred include someone who:

- is at risk of losing current placement and/or vocational setting;
- has a history of complex medical, behavioral, and/or trauma related issues;
- has exhibited a significant deterioration in functioning over the past 24 months;
- has been hospitalized or admitted to a psychiatric hospital or training center;
- has exhibited behavior that resulted in contact with law enforcement.



What is the purpose of REACH in our community?

Mobile Support

REACH provides mobile support services to the individual's system in order to maintain stability in their current placement. Services can be provided on an emergency basis.

Consultation

The clinical team will provide 24/7 crisis response and consultation. This includes continual preventative, crisis education and prevention planning for eligible adults. Once the immediate crisis is resolved, the REACH clinical team will continue to work with the individual and his/her system of supports and services in order to problem solve. This will aid in the reduction of the frequency of needed emergency interventions and assistance with ongoing stability.

Crisis Therapeutic Home

The REACH Crisis Therapeutic Home is a 6 bed home and we provide residential Crisis Stabilization and Crisis Prevention support.

We provide temporary, short-term support, evaluation, and assessment for individuals who: 1) are eligible for services; 2) no longer need acute psychiatric inpatient hospitalization; and/or 3) are not able to return to their last place of residence at the time of referral. The Program does not provide a permanent residential placement, but rather offers appropriate supports for up to 15 (youth) or 30 (adult) days based on individual need, to facilitate the individual's successful transition back to the community.
